Keynote

Daring to innovate: utilising the power of assessment for outdoor learning

Assessment in schools is a vital task that helps draw a picture of a child's academic progress over time. Assessment helps to inform curriculum and lesson planning and creates a basis for next steps in learning and development.

With changes to curriculum policy and the emphasis being placed on recording learning, schools need to provide evidence that they know not just what curriculum content is planned, but why it is included, whether the curriculum is being implemented effectively and the impact the curriculum is having on pupils' knowledge and understanding.

In this keynote, in the context of key learning from the conference day, we will consider the role of assessment within an outdoor learning pedagogy.

Deborah Lambert

Deborah Lambert is co-author of Bloomsbury's' Sustainability and Climate Change Curriculum Outdoors at KS2' and the 'National Curriculum Outdoors – a complete scheme of work' series of books.

Deborah was a network leader for North Cornwall as part of the Natural Connections demonstration project (2012-16), which was delivered and evaluated by the University of Plymouth. More recently she successfully led the Erasmus+ 'Natural Schooling; innovating the curriculum to improve pupil outcomes' project, which concluded in 2023.

She has worked as a class teacher of EYFS-KS2 in over 30 primary schools, Special Schools at KS1-4 and as a lecturer in Further Education and Higher Education and currently works with schools, supporting them in their outdoor learning journey through staff training and curriculum workshops with children.
